Reserve Current Events

The Field Station has been particularly active with volunteer assistance this July. As mentioned above, the 2010 Otter Trawl week finished with a new record in the total number of 117 combined hours of effort from technicians, interns, and volunteers compared to last years 109 hours.

This past week, volunteers once again stepped up to assist with

one particular Research Internship in Ocean Sciences (RIOS) project.

RIOS intern, Caitlin McGarigal's project focuses on the effectiveness of the motion and pressure sensitive tags used to track summer flounder movement through the bay and is trying to determine at which setting the tags are most accurate in determining

how a fish moves through the water column.

A little more on the Gulf

On Thursday, July 15th, BP finally was able to stem the flow of the oil leak—85 days and an estimated 184 million gallons later.

While the leak was capped and watched over the next 48 hrs to see if the well would hold shut, the success was a small step in the long road to recovery. There were concerns that the capped well could potentially blow or create a new leak.

The cap was designed to bottle up oil inside the well, thus keeping it from flowing into the ocean - the oil could then be

captured and piped to ships on the surface (or shut in the event of a hurricane), which was the design plan hoping to be implemented if the cap successfully held, which it has. Again, this is still a temporary fix. If any threat of a leak exists in this new cap, the oil will be re-released to prevent an even bigger oil explosion that could be caused by the new cap.

A relief well is still being drilled to more securely stop the spill. Even when that is complete, beginning a massive clean up of the oil that has already polluted

the waters around the Gulf Coast is estimated to take many, many years to come.

Projects by NOAA to assess and monitor the damage are already being advertised and funded by the scientific community. The closing of the leak is a great first sign to dealing with this environmental disaster, but there are many steps left to take before our waters are clean again.
